



"Izumo Furyu Hana Odori"
(Performed by: Izumo Furyu Hana Odori Preservation Society)

The Izumo Furyu Hana Odori is a sacred ritual dance that has been passed down for generations at Izumo Daijingu Shrine, located in Kameoka City.

On stage, the performance begins with a narrator, accompanied by a figure bearing bamboo branches and a group of singers and musicians who create a traditional, elegant atmosphere. Against this backdrop, dancers move in harmony to present a graceful and solemn spectacle rooted in ancient tradition.

Highlight of the Dance

A key highlight of the performance is the small hand-held drums that gleam in the dancers' hands, each adorned with elegant silk tassels. As the dancers move in rhythm with the lively beat of the drums, gazing skyward, stamping the ground, the tassels respond with graceful motion, swirling in brilliant circles like blooming flowers. It is a breathtaking display, where every moment becomes a living work of art woven from light and movement. Be sure not to miss it.

Following her extensive academic experience as a graduate student and postdoctoral fellow at Johns Hopkins University in the USA, Professor Pai taught medical statistics and safety promotion at the Taiwan Medical University and the National Defense Medical Center (NDMC). Since introducing the concept of Safe Communities to Taiwan in 2002, Prof. Pai has supported over 30 communities in their efforts to join the International Safe Communities Network, leading more than 20 of them to successful designation. In recognition of her significant contributions to community safety promotion, Prof. Pai is now referred as the mother of Safe Community in Taiwan.

Furthermore, she has spearheaded the Safe Community movement across the Asian region in her capacity as chair of the Asian Region Coalition of Safe Community Support Centers and vice-chair of the Asian Region Safe Community Network. In terms of her support for Japan, she has visited most of the communities working on Safe Communities and Safe Schools to conduct on-site evaluations and provide consultations to help them for further development.

Comprehensive Pre-Disaster Prevention! Preparing to Establish the Disaster Management Agency

Koichi Kawai

Senior Deputy Director-General for Disaster Management, Cabinet Office Senior Deputy Director, Preparatory Office for the Establishment of the Disaster Management Agency, Cabinet Secretariat



Born in Kyoto Prefecture, Mr. Kawai graduated from the Faculty of Law at Kyoto University in 1994 and joined the Ministry of Home Affairs (now the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications).

He has held various key positions, including Assistant Counselor to the Deputy Chief Cabinet Secretary for National Security and Crisis Management (Cabinet Secretariat), Evaluation Specialist in the Policy Evaluation and Public Relations Division (Minister's Secretariat, Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications), and First Secretary at the Embassy of Japan in the United Kingdom (Ministry of Foreign Affairs).

He later served as Deputy Director-General of the Planning and Regional Development Department of Fukuoka Prefecture, Division Head at the Secretariat of the National Governors' Association, Director-General of the Citizens' Affairs Bureau of Kanagawa Prefecture, and Director of the Finance Department at the Japan Finance Organization for Municipalities, gaining extensive expertise in local administration.

In July 2023, he served as Counselor in the Preparatory Office for the Establishment of the Headquarters for Promoting the Use of Ships in Medical Care (Cabinet Secretariat), and later as Director of the General Affairs Division of the Fire and Disaster Management Agency (Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications), before assuming his current position.

After graduating from the School of Medicine at Yonsei University in 1983, Dr. Cho began his career as a surgeon. His experience as an emergency surgeon since 1996 has led him to recognize the importance of injury prevention. During his time in the United States of America as a resercher, he encountered the concept of the International Safe Community (ISC). He subsequently introduced this concept to Korea and implemented it there after he came back to Korea. In 2000, while Suwon City officially launched ISC, he was instrumental in establishing the Community Safety Promotion Centre in the School of Medicine at Ajou University. This center is one of the pioneers among the Safe Community

Since then, he has been actively supporting the movement both domestically and across the Asian Region, including in Japan. In his capacity as vice chair of both the International Safe Community Network and the Asian Coalition of International Safe Community Support Centers, he has been making significant contributions to the development of the movement from a comprehensive perspective.

In relation to Japan, he has visited most communities working on ISC to support further development of their programs, drawing on his extensive experience and the perspective of a medical professional.

Rethinking Disaster Preparedness through the Concept of Phase-Free

This presentation will introduce Kameoka City's disaster prevention initiatives from the perspective of proactive prevention, in line with the principles of the Safe Community program. It will also explore the concept of "phase free", which has recently been featured in Japan's National Resilience Plan. ("Phase-free" refers to designing everyday items and services so that they remain useful in times of disaster, without distinguishing between normal and emergency use.) The presentation will highlight how adopting this approach contributes to creating a community where people can live with greater safety and peace of mind.

Born in Kyoto City, Mr. Fujimoto joined Kameoka City Hall in 1993 after graduating from Kyoto Gakuen University. Starting in 2013, he spent five years as Chief of Disaster Management Unit in the Community Safety and Disaster Prevention Section in the General Affairs Division. In 2018, he became Deputy Chief of the Shino Branch of the Kameoka City Fire Corps, and was appointed Section Chief of the Community Safety and Disaster Prevention Section in the General Affairs Division the following year. Within 28 years of service in the fire corps, Mr. Fujimoto has extensive experience in community-based disaster management. He has held his current position since April 2021. In November of the same year, he also became Secretary-General of the National Network of Municipalities Promoting Safe Communities (now the National Council for Safe and Secure Community Development), a role he continues to serve today.





Building a Disaster-Resilient Matsubara

This presentation will report on the measures Matsubara City is taking to strengthen its resilience against disasters such as earthquakes and floods. It will also highlight how the city is working in cooperation with the local community through the Safe Community program, including efforts to raise disaster awareness and promote proactive initiatives.

Introduction of Safe Community programs in Nan Municipality, Thailand

Teinsoot Surapol

In 2013, Nan Municipality was designated as the 316th member of the International Safe Community Network. The community of 18,000 inhabitants has been actively promoting community safety, with a 31% rate of promotion among the population. It has become a leading community in safety promotion, as evidenced by its receipt of Safety Zone certification from the Department of Tourism. The Nan Municipality has emphasized its commitment to promoting safe driving practices through various channels of mass communication. The initiative, titled "Use cars and roads safely in Nan," aims to foster a new culture of road safety in the community. It encourages the public to adopt key safety measures, such as wearing helmets by all motorcyclists, seatbelt use by drivers and passengers in cars, adherence to traffic laws, and promoting responsible behaviors like signaling before crossing the road and waiting for pedestrians to finish crossing the street.

Kokusai Anzen-toshi (International Safe Community in Japanese)



The declaration of Kokusai Anzen-toshi (International Safe Community in Japanese) was made with Towada City, Aomori Prefecture and Matsubara City, Osaka Prefecture at the Prefectural Assembly Hall in Tokyo on January 14th 2025.

The purpose of the declaration is dissemination of Safe Community with simple expression of the movement in Japanese. As the chair of the National Mayors Associationof Safe Communities, Mayor of Kameoka City called for the collaboration among Safe Communities for further propagation of the movement. In the declaration, several commitments such as contribution for the establishment of the safer society based on sharing experiences and practices with other communities are pronounced.

Dramatic Decrease in Recognized Penal Code Offenses



Compared to 2008, the number of recognized penal code offenses in Kameoka has dropped by approximately 85%. While crime is showing an upward trend nationally, Kameoka has seen a decrease for three consecutive years, reaching a record low.

Steady Decline in Traffic Accidents



Similarly, the number of traffic accidents has decreased by around 75%. Since 2014, Kameoka has maintained a level lower than the national average, reflecting the success of efforts to create a safer traffic environment.
